From The Editor's Desk

Can we confidently love God?

While watching movies or reading romantic potboilers we have often heard or read phrases like: *I* love you, or don t you know how much you mean to me? or your love is so precious to me, *I* know you ll always be there for me. These and other similar overtures of love are

blurted out by some fictitious characters not only to make us feel 'warm and fuzzy' inside but they also resonate with some secret longing in our real lives. Then one day someone *does* really make such a statement... and we are dumbfounded and confused and what is even more tragic we even begin to get suspicious.

It is not uncommon for us to be wary of such statements because all too often we've been victims of a love that is spurned or withdrawn leading us rather to take refuge in the 'fantasy world' of the novel or the movie rather than face the 'painful' reality of a love that is rejected. Relationships in our daily lives most often do not resonate with what we read in novels or see in movies but then who's to forbid us from allowing ourselves the pretended warmth of this celluloid love?

I am inclined to believe that this is probably how we treat the Word of God too. Take for example a statement like: *You are precious in my eyes and honoured, and I love you.* (Isaiah 43:4). It sounds pretty romantic and may be used, at best, as lyrics in a song with a catchy melody, but to believe that we *are* truly precious in God's eyes...and that he loves us - that could be rather difficult to accept.

Most of us probably suffer from this misconception about God's love because we've never really heard those words spoken to us by some human being and sincerely meant. At most, what we heard was probably a non-committal statement that left us without any feeling at all. Now why is that? It is because deep down we have such a poor opinion of ourselves that we can hardly believe someone would love us. - The famous Jesuit pop-psychologist John Powell had a book entitled *If you really knew me would you still love me?* The title itself very eloquently brings out just this idea.

So, our greatest challenge is the ability to receive love and to open the door of our hearts confidently to Christ who knocks. We must just keep trying till we begin to see and understand the truth that *I am loved. I am precious in his eyes and he loves me.*

What is most difficult is to try to open our hearts to accepting human love because authentic human love shares in God's love and reveals it to us. We have to give others a chance to love us and we too have to learn to *dare* to truly love others.

If we think and pray about this, true love will not be relegated to the darkness of a theatre or the pages of some romance but we will become aware of a new energy springing up within us. We will then be able to face the uncertainties and struggles of life with optimism and courage. For when we know that we are loved we are never alone.

9. THE DISABLED FOX

Ca'di the Arab mystic tells the Story of a man who was one day walking through a dense forest. He unexpectedly came upon a fox that had lost its legs and as he saw the poor animal struggle even to move a little, he wondered how the disabled fox managed to survive in that condition. Curious to find out for himself, he hid among the branches of a nearby tree. He was there only a few minutes when he spied a lion come along with game in its mouth. Having had his fill, he left the substantial remains at the side of the hungry fox who gratefully availed himself of the generosity of his benefactor.

The man saw this happen day after day, and could not but marvel at the greatness and providence of God who provided for all his creatures. especially the unfortunate ones, with tender loving care. Wishing to avail himself also of this great love of God, he decided to lie in a corner of his house and call upon God to fulfill all his needs. More than a month elapsed with nothing spectacular happening and our friend who was growing thinner and thinner now reached almost at death's door. When he began complaining to God about his plight, he heard a voice say distinctly: "You fool, imitate the lion and not the fox!'

Beggars or Princes?

As you read the story, did you discern a similarity between

vourself and the man. the fox or the lion? I guess most of us would easily identify ourselves with the man and his foolish way of thinking. Isn't our attitude generally like that of the people whom Jesus fed with the miraculous bread in the desert? All they could think of the next day was: 'Sir give us this bread always!' (Jn. 6:34) St. Paul tells us in Eph. 1:3-4. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places..." The text tells us plainly that God has already blessed us with every spiritual blessing, which really means that there is nothing more that God can give us, which he hasn't already given. Besides, he tells us in another context: 'Do not be afraid little flock, for it has pleased your Father to grant you the kingdom... Ask and you will



receive ... whatever you ask the Father in my name, I will obtain for you...!' If we really believed these words and promises of Jesus, we certainly would be able

to identify ourselves easily with the lion, not only in his confidence that he would always find enough game for himself and for his incapacitated brother, but also in his generosity and thoughtfulness.

Yet, most of us find it so easy to see ourselves as beggars denuded of all resources and means of caring for ourselves. We are so obsessed with our petty little sins we see ourselves that as perpetually unworthy of God's loving kindness. Hence, most of our prayer consists of petitions: a continuous and unending litany of 'gimme, gimme, gimme, gimme, gimme, gimme, gimme!' It isn't any wonder that we don't then have the freedom to even see or notice the needs of our neighbours and much less do we have the inclination to reach out to them. The spirituality of the majority of Christians today all over the world consists simply in a selfcentred approach of obtaining salvation of their own 'souls'. This stems from the fact that they do not vet believe that Jesus has made any difference in their lives: they still see themselves as outsiders' as regards the kingdom and they see salvation as something that they attain only after death. That the Father has already gifted them with the kingdom hasn't even crossed their minds and so they continue to see themselves as indigent and despicable beggars needing to constantly plead with the Father.

And even in this the understanding seems to be that they have to 'drag' or coax these gifts out of the hands of a miserly and parsimonious Father-God. That he waits and ardently longs

to be generous to his beloved children, (Give me a chance to wash your feet). that it is his good pleasure to grant them the kingdom is way beyond their mental horizon. The gratuitousness of God's foregiven love is a mystery, undoubtedly - but a foundational mystery on which is based our entire spiritual life's journey. This must be a response of love, stemming from initial an exclamation: 'Wow, God, our Father – it never dawned on me that You could love me so much... that You gave Your only Son to us, to die for us!' How utterly unbelievable is Your love. Lord!

Example of Early Christians

The early Christians thought otherwise and hence we see in them two attitudes refreshingly different from what we see in ourselves today: first, like us they too praved to the Father to 'give us each day our daily bread' - but in their minds this bread (standing for everything that sustains life) asked for and received is primarily with the idea of sharing it with others. That is what the Eucharist meant for them – bread that was broken to be shared. Secondly, realizing that whatever they had, has actually come from the Father and was meant to be shared, they gave generously of their belongings to anyone in need. They even went and sold their property and gave the money to the apostles. "With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. **There was not a needy person among them**, for as many as owned lands or houses, sold

them and brought the proceeds of what was sold and laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need" (Acts 4:33-36).

We hardly ever hear of such lavish generosity in the Christian community today. We do have many Christians who are generous in giving to the needy – but the all important question is: what is their understanding behind all that giving? Many still give in order to get – they believe that if they give, the Lord will bless them with more (there is absolutely no doubt that he will, but we do not give in order to get!) – or at least, that they will gain extra merit in heaven because of their giving. The key defect or deficiency that Jesus came to save us from is a preoccupation with the Self' even when that preoccupation is with spiritual gain. And when our self-



image is a poor or miserable one, it is almost impossible for us to think of anyone else but ourselves! A person experiencing a severe toothache can think of nobody else except him/herself. If s/he does think of another, it would be the dentist who can relieve him of his pain. Similarly, if we see ourselves as totally indigent and helpless, how could we possibly think of others and their needs?

Inflated Self-image Repels

The same is true when our image is an overly inflated one: as Jesus warned: "I tell you, it is far easier for a camel to go through the eve of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God. When the disciples heard this, they were greatly astounded and said, 'Then who can be saved?'" Here, the apostles seemed to be caught between the devil and the deep blue sea: damned if you do and damned if you don't! But Jesus looked at them and said, 'For mortals it is impossible, but for God all things are possible' (Mt 19:24 – 20:1). True life then lies in the middle and only God can work out a proper balance between a poor self-image and an unduly bloated one

In general most people would lean towards a negative selfimage and so if we do realize the need to work in this area of improving our self-image it would need to be in the direction of developing a healthy positive selfimage. Here again, we receive what we give. If we can train ourselves to reflect more the positive that we see in others and in every situation, then we will find others also being positive towards ourselves too. But ultimately it is God who provides with opportunities us to strengthen our positive selfimage. And to make it possible for him to do this for us, we need to leave everything into his hands through a totally loving and obedient surrender. God loves the cheerful giver – it is more blessed to give than to receive! Imitate the lion and not the disabled fox! \Box

VOCATION PROMOTION FR DOMINIC ALMEIDA: LIVING ON IN THE LIVES HE TOUCHED

r. Dominic Almeida was born on September I0, 1942 and died on April 16, 2008, at about 8.15pm after a prolonged illness which he bore with grit and determination.

Dominic was a priest who tirelessly gave himself to his work and sought the good of the institution. He planned, he dreamt of successes, he charted careers, he coached, he taught music and did everything to help the boys succeed in life. He dreamt of boys, their careers, their futures. Their life was his life. He gave himself so that they may rise. It was this giving that mattered: this commitment, this sacrifice, this generosity.

His hard work and sacrifice to achieve goals, showed his priestly zeal in imitation of Christ. Even after he had served as principal for so many years, he was ready to go to a new mission in Kuwait. He received the missionary cross and spent some months in Kuwait, a different culture with complex difficulties. Fr. Derrick Misguitta writing from Kuwait said "the province may not know that Dominic was a pioneer and missionary in Kuwait. He moved about in the scorching heat of 46 degrees. Only when he visited the doctor after he complained of some chest pain he was told that he had had a minor heart attack. He returned to India even though he was very influential there. He was much respected by the students"

Dominic was known as a disciplinarian and that was where he could have been misunderstood. He was strict and demanding, but he meant well. He had the good of the boys at heart. He wanted them to progress in life. He wanted their foundations to be strong and so he made demands on his charges.



Fr. Tony D'Souza writing from Kuwait says that he knew Dominic for many years and they were good friends. He added that even today there were many boys (now men) in Kuwait who remember Dominic with high regard.

Even when Dominic was ill, he did a simple and yet unnoticed ministry of emailing sermon notes to some of his priest friends who were unable to have easy access to such facilities. How few of us think of using our illness for ministry. I missed him on my rounds of the province as he had gone to Goa, but then when he came back he called me up and told me that he is suffering, but he offered his sufferings for the province, especially for good vocations.

We will miss him but he will live on in the lives he has touched and in the memories he has left behind. He does not die who lives in the hearts of those who love him.□

L oneliness can take many different forms. There is the loneliness of the widow or the widower, and the loneliness of the orphan. There is the loneliness of the confused youngster, and the loneliness of the alcoholic or the unemployed. There is the loneliness of old age, and the loneliness of being rejected. There is the loneliness that comes from being handicapped, or deaf, or misunderstood. There is the loneliness of the AIDS victim. Which of us can say what kind of loneliness is the worst?

I remember an old woman saying, 'If only, just for once, I could be the person giving instead of receiving. I am truly grateful for the thoughtfulness of my family. They are so generous to me. But oh, if only I were in the position to give for once!' That too was a special sort of loneliness.


Isolation and Fear

I often think that our Lady's life must have encompassed many forms of loneliness. While still very young, Mary was invited to become the mother of the Messiah. How she must have been burdened by the mystery, the awful knowledge of what was happening in her, and what was yet to come. Unable to confide in anyone, she was possibly misunderstood, bewildered, the object of vile gossip. How isolated she must have felt!

Later, after Jesus was born, she had to endure the fear that came with Simeon's words, words that foretold conflict, misunderstanding and defeat for her Son. Hearing those words must have broken her heart. How she must have longed for it to be otherwise.

Emigration and Loss

Soon after that, Mary faced some of the most forlorn years of her life,

years of forced emigration. Fleeing in terror from the threat of Herod, she had to leave all she loved to travel into a far distant land. whose language she did not speak, and whose customs differed from those of her own people. She fled into the unknown with fear at her heels. Many of those who come into the city of Mumbai looking for any menial iob will be able to understand Mary's lonely pain, for there are hardly any casual labourers who have not migrated here and whose services we pay for.

Then, when Jesus was only twelve years of age, Mary had the terrible experience of losing him. Any parent who has ever lost a child for even a short time will understand the fear that must have gripped Mary's heart.

I recall once, when my brother's children were small, going into town with them and their mother for the Christmas shopping. Somehow, in the fuss and rush, as we boarded the bus, one of the little boys got left behind. I can still hear his mother's anguished cry, as we watched the tiny figure running after the bus, trying in vain to catch it. All ended well, the good driver stopped without hesitation. It is a memory not to be forgotten. It lasted all of two minutes. The child Jesus was missing for three days.

Sad Memories and Old Age

Yet worse was to come. The years of Jesus' public life must have been lonely ones for Mary, when she seldom saw her Son, although she surely heard with dismay of the plotting against him. Later she witnessed the terrible isolation of Jesus as he hung dying on the cross, and carried with her for the rest of her life the sad memories of his trial, his scourging, his mockery, his betrayal, his desertion. What pain for a mother to endure!

Surely, here above all we can seek comfort from Mary in our own times of loneliness. She who saw her Son rejected will not fail to comfort those who feel society has cast them aside, the poor, the handicapped, the travellers, the prisoners, AIDS sufferers.

And if the elderly think that they are forgotten in the modern cult of youth, they too should remember that Mary understands. She grew old alone with her memories, some happy, some sad. Like many elderly people today, Mary knew long nights and lonely days. She has comfort for all of us in our times of loneliness.

Eucharistic Presence, Secularism, Marian Doctrine, Lourdes, Extraordinary Minister

Q. Could you please explain to me the ways in which Christ is present in our world and in particular, how is he present in the Blessed Eucharist?

A. Thank you for your question. Christ is present in many ways in the world in which we live. He is present when we gather in prayer for he promised, "When two or three gather in my name I will be with you." He is present in the Church, present in His word, and we see him in the goodness and the kindness of our neighbour. He is present in all the Sacraments but His presence in the Blessed Eucharist is described as the 'Real Presence.' This does not mean that the other ways in which Christ is present are artificial or false. We say Real Presence to emphasise that Jesus Christ, God and Man, ('body, blood, soul and divinity') is present in person on the altar in the form of bread and wine. It is more than a spiritual presence. It is not just a symbolic presence. He is present as one person is present to another person in the house. And after mass when the Blessed Eucharist is reserved in the Tabernacle, His presence there allows us to come to him at any time to seek help and guidance in our lives.

Q. At a mass recently I heard a priest talking about us being in danger of becoming a secularist society. What is secularism?

A. Secularism is an atheist or agnostic belief that rules out religious faith and values. It explains everything exclusively in terms of this world. An agnostic is someone who says we cannot know anything with certainty about God, or the afterlife. Atheists deny the existence of God in theory or in practice. Have we more atheists and agnostics today than before? It would certainly seem so, but as long as committed Christians continue to practice and defend their beliefs this is not a trend that is going to overwhelm our society.

Q. What do we have to believe in as regards the Blessed Virgin? I am concerned about this, because, as a recent convert, I accepted the traditional doctrines regarding Mary but now I see new (or at least new to me,) teachings about Mary which I find quite upsetting... please answer.

A. Thank you far your letter and for sharing your concerns with

our readers. There are dogmas formally defined concerning the Blessed Virgin Mary. They are Mary, the Mother of God; the perpetual virginity of Mary; the Immaculate Conception; and the Assumption. The new teachings you mention are not dogmas and we are not, as Catholics, required to believe them. Having been specially chosen as the Mother of God, Mary obviously has a unique position and the four defined dogmas testify to that.

The Vatican Council speaks of the Blessed Virgin's rate in the Church as follows (no 62 in the document on the Church): 'By her maternal charity, Mary cares for the brethren of her Son who still journey on earth surrounded by dangers and difficulties, until they are lead to their happy fatherland. Therefore the Blessed Virgin is invoked by the Church under the titles of Advocate. Helper, Benefactress and Mediatrix. This however is to be understood that it neither takes away from nor adds anything to the dignity and efficacy of Christ the One Mediator. For no creature could ever be classed with the Incarnate Word and Redeemer; but just as the priesthood of Christ is shared in various ways both by his ministers and the faithful so also the unique mediation of the Redeemer does not exclude but rather gives rise to a manifold cooperation which is but a sharing in this One source. The Church does not hesitate to profess this subordinate role of Mary.

But the Church has long held that because of her sinlessness and close union with her son, Mary has been given a role of mediation or intercession before God above any other human being. That is to say that though all of us, saints and sinners, are nor can be mediators of grace to one another through our prayers. Mary's mediation or intercession is superior to that of any other human being.

Q. Our Lady is reported to have appeared at many places in the world, Lourdes being the most famous of these. My question is (1) are people cured at these places and (2) why are people asked to do penance and to pray so much?

A. Miracles have been reported at many of the Shrines to Our Lady around the world. Lourdes is exceptional in that the Catholic Church has officially recognised 67 miracles and 7000 inexplicable cures at Lourdes since the Blessed Virgin appeared there in 1858. All analysed of these were scientifically before being accepted as cures. Prayer and penance are an integral part of a good Christian life and are mentioned in many of the places where Our Ladv is reported to have appeared. This follows on Our Lord's repeated mention of the need for prayer and penance in our lives.

Q. I was asked to put out the sacred host for adoration. I am not a minister of the Eucharist. What are the rules in this regard?

A. The Blessed Sacrament may be exposed for veneration by a priest, deacon, instituted acolyte or extraordinary Eucharistic minister. If, as you say, your Parish Priest asked you to expose the Blessed Sacrament I would presume that he was appointing you as an extraordinary minister of the Eucharist. For your own peace of mind I think you should consult him.





'FOR LOVE OF MY LORD JESUS' **ST. ROSALIA OF PALERMO (SEPTEMBER 4)**

bout Saint Rosalia, as with some other saints of the Church calendar, there are a lot of oral and popular devotions and traditions but very few certain historical facts to be had. There are a lot paintings of and i c o n o g r a p h i c testimonies but very little biographical data. The first biography of her life was written only about four centuries after her death and it was put together from the oral traditions and popular devotion prevalent at the time.

Even though there are no historical documents. the iconographic documentation that attests to the fact that the was ancient and her

widespread popularity among the people of Sicily and the surroundings, cannot be ignored.



Rosalia in an ecstatic moment captured by the great Flemish painter Anton Van Dyck. It is believed that the saint asked to be walled up in her cell so she could spend the last years of her life in this state of veneration of this saint particular ecstasy with greater facility.

People have prayed to her and invoked her with consistent fervor down the centuries.

According to some traditions, Rosalia was born near Palermo, into the noble Sinibaldi family of Norman extraction. On her maternal side she was linked to family of Charles the Great. Thus. she grew up in the royal court, familiar with a life of wealth and luxury of the time. Yet she was soon tired and nauseated by the the luxury. vanity and haughtiness of the life she was living and she decided to leave everything: her family, her titles and comforts, and retire from the world to live a life of solitude. In short, she chose to live a life that was diametrically opposed to what she was used to. She embraced a life of solitude, penance, prayer and meditation. Thus she began a difficult spiritual discipline, taking after the many others who had gone before her.

Rosalia went to live in a cave at San Stefano Quisquina not far from the city. An inscription found on one of the walls of this cave and perhaps written by her documented her early fervor (in Latin it read): Ego Rosalia Sinibaldi Quisquine et Rosarum domini filia, amore Domini mei Jesu Christi in hoc antro habitare decreti" (which means) "Rosalia, daughter of Sinibaldo, Lord of Quisquina and Rose, has decided to live in this cave for love of my Lord Jesus Christ." She also requested the spiritual assistance and the protection of the monks of St. Benedict who lived not far from there. From some traditions it is believed that she became a Benedictine (even some paintings attest to this fact). According to others, she belonged to the order of St. Basil.

In that cave Rosalia

courageously struggled against wild animals and hostile demons who did not look kindly on her long prayers and severe penances.

On the Slopes of Monte Pellegrino

After some time Rosalia moved closer to Palermo; precisely to a stalactite cave on the slopes of Monte Pellegrino. Here we imagine that she, more or less lived the life she had lived earlier, with the same ascetic ingredients by now tested and proven and with the same unpleasant visits from her demonic tempters. It is interesting to note that 1500 years earlier, near the cave there lived some hermits who came to be called "Hermits of St. Rosalia" (in memory of her). Attracted by the fame of her sanctity and her prayers many of the local people from Palermo came up the mountain to ask for her prayers and spiritual advice.

When Rosalia realized that she had reached the end of her earthly sojourn she laid herself in a grave and died. Tradition has it that she died on 4th September of 1166. She remained there for five centuries until the people of Palermo, the clergy and the faithful were convinced that they had found the remains of their saint. Her cult began immediately after her death: She was revered by the people of Palermo as a saint, their saint. From the end of the XII century churches, and chapels dedicated to her sprung up in Sicily and particularly in southern Italy.

How were her remains recovered from that cave where a shrine was built in her honour?

Rosalia, Patroness of Palermo

It was in 1624, when devotion to her had all but diminished, that it resumed with added vigour because of the proclamation of Rosalia as principal patroness of Palermo. There are two versions as to this turn of events. The first has it that the saint appeared on May 26th 1624 to a certain Giacoma Gatto who was suffering from the plague but she almost recovered and climbed up to the cave to thank the Virgin Mary and the saint for her recovery. In the vision Saint Rosalia pointed out to her where her own mortal remains were buried and some time later some monks found the place and the remains. The recognition that followed was not quite simple, in fact it was difficult and controversial. In short, the ecclesiastical authorities wanted to clearly verify the remains and so they proceeded with much prudence. Meanwhile the plague that had struck Palermo kept on claiming more victims among the population. The Bishop of the city Cardinal Giannettino Doria summoned clergy and the people to the cathedral to implore the intercession of the Madonna, promising her that they would

defend her title of the Immaculate Conception even to shedding of their blood and second, they would proclaim Rosalia patroness of the city.

On February 11th 1625, the bones that were recovered from the cave were authenticated by physicians as belonging to a woman and therefore were very presumably those of Saint Rosalia. Some time later (here is the second version) the saint appeared, on Monte Pellegrino, to a man that wanted to commit suicide because he was embittered by the death of his wife in the plague. Rosalia comforted him assuring him of her protection and recommended him to go to the Bishop to report that the bones recovered by the hermits in the cave were really hers and they were to be carried in procession through the streets of Palermo. The cardinal placed the relics in an urn and exposed them for the veneration of the people who carried them around the city in a solemn procession. The plague that tormented the city had gradually diminished and finally disappeared altogether.

In 1630 news arrived from Rome that Pope Urban VIII had inserted the name of the Sicilian saint into the Roman martyrology. It was in 1631. after the Roman pronouncement that an elaborate chapel was built inside the city's Cathedral with an altar dedicated especially to her. There a magnificent ornate silver urn holds the relics of the saint who is patroness of the city. It has become a place of pilgrimage not only for devotees from Palermo but for others coming from other parts of Sicily and the world. \Box

Deliver us, Lord, from the temptations of everyday, those that we meet daily and that form part of our everyday lives."

"I would like to be free (of temptation) but I am unable, I would prefer if it were not so, it would be better without it..."



This is the daily encounter of our limited humanity. In spite of the several plans and the many good intentions with which we arm ourselves on our spiritual journey....in just one moment we slip back to where we started. Each day is fraught with a thousand temptations: idleness, laziness, pride, boredom, apathy and who knows what else. Even though faith is a great gift, it does not always help us to react in the most effective way against temptation. Sometimes it is more comfortable to just allow ourselves "to be immersed" in the small problems of every day, rather than "rolling up our sleeves," getting ourselves to "start again."

God however gives us the Holy Spirit, that Source of immense and inexhaustible Power. Therefore, when, in the "Our Father" we say: "lead us not into temptation," we are actually turning to God and asking him to send us his Spirit to help us not to succumb at the moment of trial.

The Lord doesn't send us temptations, but allows these moments of testing in our lives, because they purify us and strengthen our faith. However, there are some obstacles, which at the moment of temptation could be dangerous. Here it is necessary to pray and ask for the gift of attention and vigilance, that we may not slip even unconsciously, running the risk of losing our faith.

Each of our lives is a continuous test, even if the tests are not all the same: some great, like the loss of a dear one; others are part and parcel of our everyday lives. In each day's daily monotony, for example, a temptation, if we are not careful, will gradually wear out our interior enthusiasm and lead us to abandon the practice of our faith.

It is only by looking at Jesus that we understand the true meaning of temptation.

In the desert Jesus was tempted to carry out his mission according to the values of the world but he courageously chose the Word of God.

In Gethsemane Jesus suffered and prayed to be freed from that terrible suffering, but on the cross, at the culminating moment of his passion, just before he died, he cried in a loud voice: "Father into your hands I commit my life."

The small and great crosses that accompany the journey of our lives acquire a deeper meaning if they are accepted and lived with love.

"Help us, O Lord, to discover the unsettling beauty of the Cross, because we know how to let its wonder and amazement flood us and with the help of the Holy Spirit, may we resist every temptation that would estrange us from you."

POPE BENEDICT XVI on the Our Father

(Jesus of Nazareth p. 163 -164)

When we pray the sixth petition of the Our Father in a more practical way we pray it saying to God: "I know that I need trials so that my nature may be purified. When you decide to send me these trials, when you give evil some room to maneuver, as you did with Job, then please remember that my strength goes only so far. Don't overestimate my capacity. Don't set too wide the boundaries within which I may be tempted, and be close to me with your protecting hand when it becomes too much for me."

When we pray the sixth petition

of the Our Father, we must therefore, on one hand, be ready to take upon ourselves the burdens of trials that is meted out to us. On the other hand, the object of the petition is to ask God not to mete out more than we can bear, not to let us slip from his hands. We make this prayer in the trustful certainty that Saint Paul has articulated for us: "God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your strength, but with the temptation will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it." (1 Cor 10:13)



When I was asked to leave my home in Italy and make a trip to Paray-le-Monial it was only then that I was to realize "what" and "who" the Church really was. It was not something in stone and mortar but something invisible yet eternal and I must be an active member. But how was I to know this?

During the Mass of the Episcopal consecration of Monsignor Bernini Dante on December 10, 1970 at Quercia, Viterbo, I was standing in a pew trying to see the celebration. While my physical eyes followed what was happening my inner eyes saw an image I will never forget. That indelible impression would completely transform me.

I saw the Blessed Virgin cradling her wounded and suffering Son in her arms and while she held his lifeless, lacerated body she seemed to say to me: "You will not share my pain but you will comfort me." It was as if someone was pointing at me.

This internal vision lasted only for a very brief moment but it was indelibly engraved in me and it taught me all I needed to know about the Church!

I soon understood that the Church was the Body of Christ incarnated in history. It was made up of all the wounded and suffering millions of cells that existed down the centuries! As I thought of this I was filled with a profound love for Christ and his sorrowful mother. The following day, on my return, I got down at Foligno to meet the Bishop of the place. Till then this was something inconceivable for me! I did not come from a family of practicing Catholics and my parents never

even went to Mass! What was more, in my childhood I had never encountered a truly Christian person, not even the priest who taught Catechism. It was considered useless and a waste of time!

Some time later my first spiritual director taught me to reform these attitudes that would not help me. I wrote about all this to his "successor," Father De La Chapelle of Paray-le-Monial and he made me understand more clearly the point of doing everything with the Bishop and in obedience to the Church! That has been my life since then.

But why do I speak of this today? I do so because I am pained and I cannot forget Our Lady of La Salette, the weeping Madonna, who was the origin of my conversion. Because of the numerous wounds that the Church receives today, I have the impression that we are passing through a time of decay, not in the Church because, being the body of Christ it will never crumble, but because human hearts who bear the image of God

within themselves do not wish to obey God's laws anymore.

Despite my 76 years, I don't think I am old-fashioned or conservative. I know this from the love I experience from so many youngsters who visit me! But today their way of involvement is influenced by the rest of the world that urges them to question their own values and their own self-worth.

Girls, for instance, who quietly pass by a man while going to Mass and receive the Body of Christ on the advice of a priest or a friar say that, "it is not serious, it's normal for two people fall in love…", or having discussed among themselves, they are of the opinion that confession is foolish and old-fashioned and practiced only by conservatives. So I ask: are these young people responsible for the predicament into which they have fallen?

Our loving Lord, humble and patient, suffers at the state of all those who are placed in charge of his young sheep, teachers, parents and even consecrated persons who fail to guide these youngsters anymore because they do not teach the truths of the Faith presented in the Catechism of the Church to those who come to them.

Today's proponents of psychology and various theologies question everything because they are afraid to pass for being termed antiquated or deficient. On the other hand there is much evil done within the Church when you encounter some fanatics among either the laity or the clergy who are always aggressively pursuing some crusade against this or that, believing that they know everything with unshakable certainty and this entitles them to be ready to wage war



O Lord forgive us, but first of all, pardon me, since I do not know how to give you anything other than my life in your service and for in the service of truth even though I have neither merit nor virtue.

Don Bosco: The Times, The Man, The Facts

DON BOSCO'S FIGHT AGAINST SIN

s priest, Don Bosco was always at war against sin." This is how Father Michael Rua. the first successor of Don Bosco begins his testimony at the process of his beatification. If we think of the many initiatives and works of the "Father and Teacher" of Youth." we discover that they had as their one purpose the struggle The against sin. educational method of this priest, called "preventive," was meant to prevent mistakes and sins in voung people.

"I Would Make any Sacrifice"

"In the novenas before big feasts Don Bosco always told us to starve the devil by not committing sins," Father Rua continues. "In time of calamity he taught us, that before anything else, in order to get out safe, one had to flee from mortal sin. To those who asked him what they needed to do to obtain any kind of grace or favour,

he always advised them to make their peace with God through the sacrament of Penance. Hearing him speak of committing sacrileges or other serious sin he seemed very worried and distressed and he suffered much. This also happened when he heard someone swearing. He seemed serious and he suffered. Once he told me: "In Confession when I hear someone repeat a swear word with which he accuses himself I seem to lose all my strength." If someone told him about a scandal that his youngsters were exposed to by some bad companions, he would painfully exclaim: "What a disaster!" And he would immediately go about trying to repair the damage. When he found that he had to be away from Turin Don Bosco's only fear was

that sin would infiltrate his house. He never missed an opportunity to write to the Superiors, warning them of the traps that the devil would lay to ensnare them. Even in his common letters to his boys he would forewarn them against the traps of the enemy (the devil). To fight sin he founded houses that would welcome boys. "For certain abandoned youngsters and for others who lived with scandals in their homes it was not enough to instruct them on feast days. If they needed to be saved they had to be kept far from evil even during the week." In fact, when he came to know that there were young people in similar situations he invited them to come to his house in preference to others. One day, speaking of youngsters found ťhis in miserable situation, exposed to dangers of committing crime or being lured by some bad companion he would be moved and with tears in his eyes he would exclaim: "For these youngsters I would make any sacrifice, even gladly shedding my blood to save them," and he recommended us to use the same sensitivity toward them," concludes Father Rua (2409 B3-B4).

A Dangerous Tavern

All Don Bosco's work, from oratories, schools, from the hours spent in hearing the confessions of his boys while they were playing in the courtyard had just one aim and that was to help the boys to avoid sin and be free to love and serve the Lord.

Already as a boy, Johnny Bosco began to develop in himself this sensibility to fight against sin. "As a youngster he committed himself to entertain his companions with honest fun so as to keep them away from sin," testified Father Rua. "Close to the Café Pianta

where Johnny Bosco worked as a waiter, he mentioned that sometimes when they played pool, Pianta appointed Johnny Bosco to keep the score. When someone cursed, or began to use indecent language Johnny became serious and objected to that behaviour. Quite a few of those who frequented the place pleaded with the owner of the café not to put Johnny as the score-keeper anymore because it hurt their respectability and prevented them from speaking as they liked" (2409 B l).

For Don Bosco the struggle with against sin begins prevention, that means preventing boys finding themselves in situations where they would be unable to avoid sin. "Near the house of Don Bosco was an inn where, on feast days, coarse ill-bred ruffians gathered, cursed and sang bawdy songs during the religious services," recalled Father Rua. "Don Bosco saw the danger that that house represented for his boys and he knew the dangers that he would have to face if he tried to prevent those gatherings. At a very heavy price he took over the lease of that entire house and sent away all the tenants, causing serious disorder and despite the threats and even attacks against his person he refused to give up his work of saving his poor boys (2408 E 11).

The Best Tool

One of the tools that Don Bosco considered the most effective for combating sin is the sacrament of Reconciliation. He often recommended it to his boys and gave them many occasions to approach this sacrament. "Despite

his many preoccupations, Don Bosco never avoided his role as a minister of reconciliation," testified Father Michael Rua. Habitually Don Bosco heard confessions for two or three hours every day. Often, however especially on big feasts or during the spiritual retreats he sat for whole davs and sometimes whole nights. Even when he was sick he did not stop hearing confession. Even during his last illness Don Bosco kept up this sacred duty. With great tenderness he passed on to his priests, his spiritual sons, the promptness of a minister of confession. (. ..) In order to give his students the freedom necessary to approach the sacrament, from the first days of the Oratory, Don Bosco usually invited other priests to whom the boys were free to go to for their confession" (2408 Ā. 10).

Even through what today we call "social communication" Don Bosco helped his neighbour to fight sin because he already saw the importance of communication for the salvation of the soul: he correctly instructed Christians through articles and books.

Don Bosco educated his boys to fight against sin because it estranged them from God. □

VATICAN

The Shroud of Turin, revered by many as the burial cloth of Christ, will be displayed to the public for the first time in a decade in 2010.

Pope Benedict XVI announced during a June 2nd audience with pilgrims from Turin that he had approved the shroud's removal from its protective casket for display to the public in the spring of 2010.

He told the 7000 pilgrims gathered in the Vatican's Paul VI hall, "If the Lord grants me life and health, I, too, hope to come and see the shroud displayed."


According to tradition, the 14-foot by four-foot linen cloth is the burial shroud of Jesus. The shroud has a full-length photonegative image of a man, front and back, bearing signs of wounds that correspond to the Gospel accounts of the torture Jesus endured in his passion and death.

The Church has never officially ruled on the shroud's authenticity, saying judgments about its age and origin belonged to scientific investigation. Scientists have debated its authenticity for decades, and studies have led to conflicting results.

The shroud lies protected

It will be displayed for the first time in a decade in 2010 behind bulletproof glass in a special chapel of Turin's Cathedral of St. John the Baptist. The cloth lies flat, unseen, inside a casket made of special space-age alloy that is waterproof and fireproof and is hermetically sealed to keep out oxygen.

The shroud is removed only for very special spiritual occasions, and its removal for study or display to the public must be approved by the pope. The last time it was displayed to the public was in 2000 for the jubilee year.

Cardinal Severino Poletto of Turin, papal custodian of the Shroud of Turin, had requested the shroud be displayed in two years.

During the June 2nd audience, the Pope said he was happy to grant the archbishop's wish.

Pope Benedict said it would be "a propitious occasion" for the faithful "to contemplate that mysterious face that silently speaks to the heart of humankind, inviting them to recognize the face of God."

At the end of the Vatican audience, the spokesman for the

shroud's custodian Msgr. Giuseppe Ghiberti, presented the pope with a life-size production of the shroud. (CNS)

POLAND

The remains of the parents of St. Therese of Lisieux, France, have been exhumed as French Catholics await the couple's expected beatification.

"This beatification will be important not only for the church in France, but for families everywhere who've prayed through the intercession of this married couple who lived in a different epoch but experienced the same strains as all parents," said Dominique Monvielle, director of Lisieux's pilgrimage centre on June 4th. The bodies of Louis and Zelie Martin



were disinterred on May 27th from graves outside St. Therese's Basilica in Lisieux and will be reburied after preservation work in the basilica crypt in September. Monieville told Catholic News Service that Pietro Schillero, a 6year-old Italian boy whose cure from a fatal lung condition at 13 months was recognized as a miracle by the Church in June 2003. exhumation attended the ceremony with his parents who had prayed to the Martins for a cure.(CNS)

CZESTOCHOWA

Three 18th Century musical scores discovered in a collection at Poland's Jasna Gora monastery may be the work of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, experts say. The musical scores identified as 18th century manuscript copies "correspond to the style" of the period and "their character allows us to suppose Mozart was their author", musicologist Remigiusz Pospiech told Poland's Polska daily.

The three scores are among 18 musical manuscripts attributed to the Austrian genius in the Jasna Gora monastery's vast archive at Czestochowa, but do not figure in the Koechel catalogue of Mozart's complete works. A special commission has already started analyzing the authenticity of 18 scores which are signed with the name of the Austrian composer, Polskie Radio says. The notes under examination were put on paper by 18th century copyists.

Polish specialists have already contacted experts in Vienna and Salzburg, Mozart's birthplace in Austria, focused on music in the period between 1756 and 1791 according to Pospiech. Archives at Jasna Gora monastery hold some 3,000 manuscripts of musical scores, collected over the centuries for the needs of its orchestra. The Monastery of Jasna Gora in Czestochowa, Poland, is third largest Catholic the pilgrimage site in the world. Home to the beloved miraculous icon of Our Lady of Czestochowa, the monastery is also the national shrine of Poland and the centre of Polish Catholicism. CATHNEWS

NEW YORK

The Vatican has given a mixed reaction to the exclusion of Pope Benedict XVI from Time magazine's 2008 list of the world's 100 most influential people.

"I am happy that Pope Benedict is absent from this list, the composition of which is kind of bizarre and arbitrary," said Jesuit Father Federico Lombardi, Director of the Vatican Press Office and TV. "They used criteria that are totally extraneous to the religious and moral authority of the pontiff," he commented.

But Giovanni Maria Vian, the new editor-in-chief of the Vatican daily L'Osservatore Romano, said the pope's exclusion from the list was "disconcerting."

"It's absurd to prefer an unknown Mexican golfer or the



author of a book on cooking to the pope, a person known throughout the world," he said.

For the fifth year in a row, Time magazine has published the list based on input from its correspondents around the world and experts in various fields, with the final decision taken by its editorial team.

Time's list is divided into five categories: artists and entertainers; scientists and thinkers; leaders and revolutionaries; heroes and pioneers, and builders and titans – each category having 20 names.

Under leaders and revolutionaries, Time listed three religious leaders: the Dalai Lama, the Ecumenical (Orthodox) Patriarch of Constantinople Bartholomew I and Iraq's Shi'ite Muslim-religious-political leader Muqtada al-Sadr.

The current pope had been on the list for the past three years, in 2005 as Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, and in 2006 and 2007 as Pope Benedict XVI. Adi Ignatius of Time said that although the pope had been considered, this year's exclusion was to "allow others the possibility to appear". (*The Universe*)



VATICAN

If aliens exist, they may be a different life form that does not need Christ's redemption, the Vatican's chief astronomer said. Jesuit Father Jose Funes, director of the Vatican Observatory, said Christians should consider alien life as an "extraterrestrial brother" and a part of God's creation.

Father Funes, an Argentine named to his position by Pope Benedict XVI in 2006, made the remarks in an interview published on May 13th by the Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano.

Father Funes said it was difficult to exclude the possibility that another intelligent life exists in the universe.

Just as God created multiple forms of life on earth, he said, there may be diverse forms throughout the universe.

"This is not in contrast with the faith, because we cannot place limits on the creative freedom of God," he said.

Asked about implications that the discovery of alien life might

pose for Catholic redemption, Father Funes cited the Gospel parable of the Shepherd who left his flock of 99 sheep in order to search for the one that was lost.

"We who belong to the human race could really be that lost sheep, the sinners who need a pastor," he said.


"God became man in Jesus in order to save us. So if there are also other intelligent beings it is not a *given* that they need redemption. They might have remained in full friendship with their creator," he said. Father Funes went on to say that Christ's incarnation and sacrifice was a unique and unrepeatable event. But he said he was sure that, if needed, God's mercy would be offered to aliens, as it was to humans. (*CNS*)

ALGERIA

A Catholic priest in Algeria has been sentenced to a year in prison for praying with Christians in Cameroon. Father Pierre Wallez is the first victim of legislation approved in March 2006 prohibiting directing a religious ceremony in a place which has not been recognized by the government in Algeria. Speaking on Vatican Radio, Alger Archbishop Henri Teisser said, "The most surprising thing is that the conviction was issued simply because the priest visited a group of Christians in Cameroon. He had not celebrated Mass, but was only joining them in a prayer. The prelate said the sentence will not be carried out. because the tribunal decided to modify it to a sentence of parole. The new law on worship sought above all to control clandestine evangelical proselytizing groups. Cathnews 🗖
